How Teck's Professional Development Program is growing talent from within

The Professional Development Program (PDP) at Red Dog was created to provide employees with the opportunity to advance their careers by developing their skills and experience while still earning a salary.

PDP participants work in the summer and either go back to school in the fall or work as an intern for Teck or NANA-affiliated companies, while still earning 80% of their Red Dog wages. Participants who choose to go back to school to earn their degrees or certificates are eligible for tuition reimbursement or student loan repayment.

These opportunities allow employees to gain the knowledge, experience and skills necessary to prepare for the next stage of their careers or to explore alternative career tracks at Red Dog, NANA and Teck.

Nicole Tisru Naagaayiq Tickett (UAA) Geology

Nicole is from Shungnak and her parents are Crystal Bessie Ticket and the late Stanley Custer, Jr.

Her career began at Red Dog as a Grade Control Technician, where she played a key role in building stockpiles for the mill and teamed up with planners and managers to ensure smart, efficient material management in the Aqqaluk Pit.

This year, she is a junior at University of Alaska Anchorage and working toward a degree in geology.

“Geology is at the core of everything in mining,” Nicole says. “It defines where and how we mine. From exploration through production, geology helps identify ore zones, determine zinc grade percentages and understand the structure and behavior of the rock.” *(continued on page 3)*

Letter from the General Manager



Hello everyone,

As winter approaches and the holidays draw near, I hope each of you can spend time with loved ones and take a moment to reflect on all we accomplished this summer and fall.

The end of September marked the close of a very successful treated water discharge season. Managing the total water volume that accumulates mainly from annual precipitation is critical to keeping our operations running smoothly. I'm very grateful to everyone who contributed to this success, including our operations, maintenance, technical, supply chain, environment, and projects teams.

In October, we wrapped up a safe and busy shipping season with about 1.25 million wet metric tonnes of concentrate shipped. This year also set a record for freight tonnage delivered by sealift: 96,300 tons, equivalent to 7,705 NAC flights.

Despite this high volume of work and coordination, we had no environmental incidents or significant injuries. That is quite an achievement and we are proud of it. Thank you to our Supply Chain Team, our Port and Operations teams, and our supporting contractors and suppliers, including Foss Maritime, Fed Nav, DeLong Mountain Logistics, Alaska Marine Lines, Ruskin Construction, Foss, and Delta Western. Your teamwork made this season a true success.

In this issue of Suvisi, you'll also find exciting news about Teck's agreement with Anglo American, a merger that will position our combined company as a global leader in critical minerals. We're also pleased to introduce our seasonal and professional development interns. These internships not only help build the next generation of leaders at Red Dog but also bring new perspectives to how our departments operate. We're grateful for their contributions and wish them all the best as they continue their careers and studies.

Teck announces merger with Anglo American: Combining to create a global minerals champion




On September 9, Teck announced an agreement with Anglo American to form Anglo Teck – a new Canadian-headquartered global leader in critical minerals and one of the world's top five copper producers.

This merger of equals brings together two companies with complementary strengths and shared values. Anglo Teck will feature a strong portfolio of copper, zinc (including Red Dog), iron ore, and other critical minerals across North America, Latin America, Southern Africa, and Europe.

“It is a natural progression of our strategy and portfolio simplification, which created a platform to enable exactly this sort of transformative transaction,” says Jonathan Price, Teck President and CEO. “Bringing together our world-class copper assets, premium iron ore and zinc operations and an outstanding pipeline of high-quality growth projects provides enormous resiliency and optionality.”

Zinc will remain central to Teck’s strategy, as an essential critical mineral and a key component of our long-term growth plans.



Importantly, this merger strengthens our ability to invest in current and future projects, including the Red Dog Mine Life Extension (MLE) project—a priority for the combined company. Red Dog remains one of the world's most significant zinc producers and a cornerstone of our future strategy.

The combined company will bring new capacity and expertise to support the responsible advancement of the Red Dog MLE project towards the goal of continued delivery of substantial social and economic benefits to the region.


Together, the combined company will continue to uphold our collective commitments to sustainable operations and responsible resource development.

“Through this merger we will remain fully committed to our longstanding partnership with NANA and all existing agreements,” says Les Yesnik, Red Dog’s General Manager. “We will continue to work closely with our stakeholders including NANA and our supportive communities to build a mutually beneficial future for Red Dog. This includes honoring our past commitments and continuing to prioritize local employment, contracting opportunities, and community investment.”

The merger is expected to be complete in 2026, pending regulatory approvals.


